Under Section 44 the Board must, on receipt of that confirmation, make a Review Proposal under Section 37 (Review of Premises Licence on Licensing Board's initiative).

The information given by the Police is limited to that given above, and does not contain details of the charge, e.g. place, date, circumstances. However, the PLH's solicitors have supplied further information: the offence relates to the store in Barnsley. While working at night, while the store was closed to the public, an employee slipped in a walk-in freezer which is not accessible to the public. The PLH reported this accident to the local Council under Health & Safety legislation, was prosecuted and pleaded guilty.

2. Action

Given

- (a) that the conviction relates to Premises outside North Ayrshire and is unlikely to have a bearing on Premises within the Board's area, and
- (b) the likelihood that the conviction relates to the operation of a food shop as opposed to the selling of alcohol,

the Board may wish to conclude the Review by taking no action. If the Board considers that Revocation or the other steps otherwise available may be appropriate, and wishes to be addressed by the Licence Holder, the case should be continued to a later meeting.

1. Background

The Board has received confirmation from the Chief Constable that the Personal Licence Holder has been convicted of a 'relevant or foreign offence'. Copies of the letter will be distributed to Members at the Meeting.

The information was not supplied by the Holder within one month after the date of the conviction. Board staff only learned of the conviction from a newspaper story. Failure to do so without reasonable excuse is an offence under Section 82(5).

The Chief Constable is entitled to make a recommendation that the Personal Licence should be Revoked, Suspended or Endorsed, but has not done so.

2. Procedure

Under Section 83(7) the Board must, on receipt of that confirmation, hold a Hearing and give the Personal Licence Holder and the Chief Constable an opportunity to be heard.

At the Hearing, the Board must have regard to

- (a) the conviction
- (b) any comments made by the Personal Licence Holder,
- (c) any comments made by the Chief Constable.

3. Board's Powers on Review

If the Board it considers it is necessary for any of the Licensing Objectives, the Board may:

- (a) Revoke the Personal Licence,
- (b) Suspend the Personal Licence for up to 6 months,
- (c) Endorse the Personal Licence. An Endorsement lasts 5 years. If a holder gets 3 Endorsements in a 5 year period, then there is a further Hearing, at which the Licence might be Suspended (for up to 6 months) or Revoked.

The Board is not obliged to take any of these steps, and may decide to take no further action. The Personal Licence Holder can appeal to the Sheriff against any decision taken at a Hearing.

The premises are being substantially reconstructed, and the bar (originally on the first floor) is now to be on the ground floor. Building Control have no objection but Licence-holder will have to obtain a Completion Certificate before allowing the public on the Premises.

Not an issue for the Board, but there is a Planning issue, see Variation 3.

The arrangements for under-18 access are not changing but given that the building as a whole has several different functions and the alcohol part is being relocated, the Applicant might consider whether or not the Operating Plan might be clarified. Suggestion:

OP 6(b) (Terms) - After the text describing the access arrangements for the soft play area and the cinemas, continue:

"In the area where alcohol may be sold:

Children (aged 0-15): allowed if both with adult and having a meal.

Young Persons (16-17): allowed without either an adult or having a meal."

OP 6(d) (Times) - "Children allowed until 10.00 p.m.. Young Persons allowed for the whole Core Hours."

OP 6(e) (Parts) - "Children and Young Persons allowed in all public parts of the Premises except within 1 metre of the bar."

terrace. Even if the Board allows 'outdoor drinking', this will only amend the Operating Plan part of the <u>Licence</u>. It would remain the case that the area could only be used if and when the <u>Planning Authority</u> (separate from the Board) decided to vary the Planning condition.

Variation 4: Allow hot drinks/soft drinks before 11.00 a.m. in outdoor area

If the outdoor area is permitted, it would be subject to NALB Standard Condition C.5.2:

The premises are a restaurant facing onto Gallowgate Street. The proposal is to replace the existing fixed windows with sliding door-windows, and to build a balcony on the street frontage. The occupant capacity will not change, and remains 40 persons.

The proposed Outdoor Drinking Area would be used for the sale of alcohol during the Premises' existing hours: 11.00 - 22.00 (6 days), 12.30 - 22.00 (Sunday).

That area would be used for the sale of food and non-alcoholic drinks from 9.00 a.m..

There are (to date) no third-party objections.

3. Issues

This gives the position for each of the numbered 'Variation Requests' summarised above. Where the legislation makes a decision mandatory, this is stated. Otherwise, the Board has a discretion whether to grant or refuse the request. Possible issues with L.O.s or Board Policy are highlighted.

Variation 1: Add outdoor drinking area	
Discretionary refusal	
Notes:	
The Board would have to be satisfied that the proposals were	e not inconsistent with

any of the Licensing Objectives, and in particular L.O. (c): 'preventing public nuisance'.

The Board is entitled to ask the Applicant to vary the proposal, e.g. to alter the times or locations of activities which might lead to noise or other nuisance.

Board may consider that its Standard Conditions are sufficient:

- "C.5.1 No loudspeakers, televisions, radios or other devices for amplifying sound shall be positioned at any time in Outdoor Drinking Areas.
- C.5.2 No drinks (alcoholic or not) shall be taken into or consumed in such areas earlier than 11.00 a.m. and later than 10.00 pm.."

If the Board allows Outdoor Drinking, and is later satisfied that this is inconsistent with any L.O. or that any Licence condition has been breached, it has the right to Vary the Licence so as to limit or remove the permission.

The proposed area is small and is immediately adjacent to the public footpath. The justification for Condition C.5.1 is Licensing Objective (c) ('preventing public nuisance'). Amplifying equipment which was situated within the building would have much the same potential for causing nuisance as equipment in the outdoor area itself if the door-windows were left open. The Applicant may wish to undertake to the Board that any such equipment will be kept under staff control and that noise will be kept at a level which does not cause nuisance to the general public. The Applicant is advised to seek the advice of NAC Environmental Services.

Variation 2: Amend Condition so as to allow use of that area from 9.00 a.m.

Discretionary refusal

Notes:

The extended use relates only to food and non-alcoholic drinks (the sale of alcohol will keep to the existing licensed hours). NALB Condition C.5.2 applies (see note to Variation 1).

1. Preliminary

This case was first considered by the Board on 22 May 2013. There were then three potential issues (See Para. 3). Two of these were considered by the Board, and the Board concluded that neither provided a reason to refuse. The Board decided that consideration of the remaining issue (overprovision) should be deferred until it had the usual health and licensing information.

2. Summary of Proposal

The Applicant has applied for the Grant of a Provisional Premises Licence (PPL).

The proposal is to include an off-sales facility in the existing convenience store associated with the petrol filling station at Hill Roundabout (between the A736 and Littlestane Road). The shop opens 24 hours a day, 7 days a week, although the alcohol hours requested are 10.00 - 22.00, 7 days a week. This is the maximum permitted by the legislation and is within NALB Policy.

The PPL relates to Premises which are to be converted for use as Licensed Premises, and is valid for a period of four years. During this period, the Applicant can request the Board to Confirm the PPL, or to extend the period.

The Premises cannot sell alcohol until the PPL is Confirmed. The Licence-Holder will apply to the Board for Confirmation once the conversion is complete, and after Certificates as to Building Control (and if appropriate Food Hygiene) are issued. Confirmation is usually done by the Clerk or other officers under the Scheme of Delegations.

The Board decision on the PPL relates <u>only</u> to licensing legislation, and does not indicate permission or certification under other legislation, such as Planning or Building Control. If the PPL is granted, the Premises cannot operate until all other legislative requirements are met.

3. Issues

There were initially 3 potential Grounds for Refusal, although after 22 May only issue (c) remains to be considered:

- (a) Excluded Premises
- (b) Public Health
- (c) Overprovision

(c) - Overprovision may result if the Application is granted

Section 23(5) of the Licensing (Scotland) Act 2005 provides:

"The grounds for refusal are— ...

- (e) that, having regard to the number and Capacity of-
 - (i) Licensed Premises, or
 - (ii) Licensed Premises of the same or similar description as the Subject Premises,

in the locality in which the Subject Premises are situated, the Board considers that, if the Application were to be granted, there would, as a result, be Overprovision of Licensed Premises, or Licensed Premises of that description, in the locality."

Section 7(2) provides:

"It is for the Licensing Board to determine the "localities" within the Board's area for the purposes of this Act."

The Board's Overprovision Policy distinguishes Premises by 'Function Types':

- 1. Off-sales
- 2. Nightclubs
- 3. Other On-sales (e.g. public houses)
- 4. Premises where the principal activity is the provision of accommodation, meals or non-alcoholic refreshment

The Subject Premises are in Function Type 1. There is a presumption of refusal due to:

- (a) Scottish Government guidance, and
- (b) the Board's own Licensing Policy Statement.

The Clerk has prepared two sets of documents for the consideration of the Board:

(a) Licence Summary

This covers this and nearby Intermediate Zones, giving figures for capacity of similar Premises and population. The 4 IZ areas which seem relevant here are:

43 (Irvine Perceton and Lawthorn)

where the proposed premises are, and the nearby

- 40 (Girdle Toll and Stanecastle)
- 36 (Irvine Broomlands)
- 37 (Irvine Bourtreehill)

(b) NHS Information on health and social indicators

The Board has when considering overprovision in the past had regard to the NHS document - "Health and Wellbeing Profiles 2010 Spine Pack". This gives scores (by IZ) comparing parts of NA with the Scottish average for 59 indicators.

The document consists of one page for each of the 38 IZs within NALB, and the Board will have the relevant pages for those 4 IZs.

The indicators which appear relevant are:

- 1 Life expectancy males
- 2 Life expectancy females
- 9 Patients hospitalised with alcohol conditions
- 10 Deaths from alcohol conditions
- 38 Population income deprived
- 39 Working age population employment deprived
- 40 Working age population claiming Jobseeker's Allowance
- 41 Dependence on out of work benefits or child tax credit
- 43 Crime rate
- 44 Prisoner population
- 46 Patients hospitalised after an assault

Conclusion

Those documents are attached to the Agenda.

The Board should invite submissions from the Applicant with a view to satisfying the Board that Overprovision would not result if the Application was granted.

The Board should consider all the potential Grounds of Refusal set out above. If any apply, the Board must refuse. If none apply, the Board must grant: Section 23(4)-(5).

However, the Board is obliged to grant the Application if the Applicant accepts a suitable modification to the Operating Plan or Layout Plan (or both), where that modification deals with the potential ground for refusal: Section 23(7).



The Board should consider whether or not the proposal is consistent with Licensing Objective (c): 'preventing public nuisance'. Variation 1: Surrender special status as a 'Section 125 Club'

Discretionary refusal - Possible reason: The Variation may create Overprovision

Notes:

Variation 2 follows from Variation 1: if Variation 1 is refused, Variation 2 will be unnecessary, but if Variation 1 is granted, Variation 2 is essential.

The Board should not determine either Variation until satisfied that the proposed Premises Manager holds a Personal Licence.

At present, the Club has the Special Status given to Clubs by Section 125 of the Act. This Special Status means that the Club has lower Licensing fees, does not require to have either a Premises Manager or Baby-Changing Facilities, and the Club is not taken into account in any consideration of Overprovision.

A consequence of having the Special Status is that the Club can have no more than 12 Occasional Licences per year.

The purpose of the present Variation is to surrender the Special Status. This will mean that the Club will be licensed like any commercial Premises (such as a Public House or a Restaurant) although, by applying special Licence Conditions known as 'Part K of the Board's Standard Conditions', the character of the Club will be preserved.

Entry to the Premises, the use of facilities and the consumption of alcohol will be limited to Members <u>except</u> where the Premises are used for a <u>bona fide</u> pre-booked function (such as a wedding reception or birthday party), when persons other than Members can:

The Subject Premises are in Function Type 1. There is a presumption of refusal due to:



1. Background

By letter of 24 April 2013 the Chief Constable made a Review Application under Section 36 informing the Board of certain circumstances relating to these Premises. Copies of the letter will be distributed to Members at the Meeting.

2. Ground for Review

The Chief Constable submits that there are grounds relevant to the following Licensing Objective:

"(a) preventing crime and disorder"

3. Capacity etc.

The Premises are Licensed for off-sales only and have a display capacity of 20.67 square metres.

4. Licensed Hours

The operating hours are 10.00 - 22.00, 7 days a week.

5. Additional Powers of inquiry

The Board may:

- (a) obtain further information as it thinks fit;
- (b) consider <u>any</u> possible Ground for Review even though it is not relevant to any circumstances alleged in the original Review Application or Proposal. If the Board proposes to do this, it should inform the Licence Holder of its intention and consider whether an adjournment is appropriate.

6. Board's Powers on Review

The Board must hear the Applicant and the Licence Holder, and decide whether or not a Ground for Review is established.

If so, the Board may take any one or more of the following steps if it considers necessary or appropriate for the purposes of any of the Licensing Objectives:

- (a) issue a Written Warning to the Licence Holder;
- (b) make a Variation of the Licence either indefinitely or for a specific time. The Variation may relate to any part of the Licence, for example:
 - (i) the operating hours for the Premises (or any part);
 - (ii) the Premises Manager (if any) can be removed;
 - (iii) the activities which may be carried on on the Premises (or any part);
 - (iv) the terms for access by persons under 18 to the Premises (or any part);
 - (v) the Licence Conditions (the Variation cannot alter the statutory Mandatory Conditions);
- (c) Suspend the Licence for a specific time;
- (d) Revoke the Licence.

The Board is not obliged to take any of these steps, and it may decide that although a Ground for Review is established, no action is required.

The Board may take these steps either on the basis of the original Review Procedure, or on the basis of information obtained in the course of the Review Procedure.

Personal Licence Review Hearing - Section 84A

1. Background

Section 84A entitles the Chief Constable to report to the Board where he considers that any Personal Licence Holder has acted in a manner which is inconsistent with any of the Licensing Objectives.

By letter of 29 April 2013 the Chief Constable reported certain circumstances relating to the Personal Licence Holder. Copies of the letter will be distributed to Members at the Meeting.

2. Procedure

Under Section 84A(2) the Board must, on receipt of that Report, hold a Hearing and give the Personal Licence Holder and the Chief Constable an opportunity to be heard.

At the Hearing, the Board must have regard to

- (a) the Report
- (b) any comments made by the Personal Licence Holder,
- (c) any comments made by the Chief Constable.

3. Board's Powers on Review

If the Board it considers it is necessary for any of the Licensing Objectives, the Board may:

- (a) Revoke the Personal Licence,
- (b) Suspend the Personal Licence for up to 6 months,
- (c) Endorse the Personal Licence. An Endorsement lasts 5 years. If a holder gets 3 Endorsements in a 5 year period, then there is a further Hearing, at which the Licence <u>might</u> be Suspended (for up to 6 months) or Revoked.

The Board is not obliged to take any of these steps, and may decide to take no further action. The Personal Licence Holder can appeal to the Sheriff against any decision taken at a Hearing.
